Andre Martel stands in the way of a healthier New Hampshire.

(And Big Tobacco is very happy with him.)

Secondhand smoke contains 4,000 chemicals, including arsenic and cyanide. The Surgeon General says that secondhand smoke is “a serious health hazard that can lead to disease and premature death in children and nonsmoking adults.”

New Hampshire’s smoke-free bill (H.B. 1177) would have protected us from deadly secondhand smoke by requiring smoke-free workplaces, restaurants and bars.



But our State Senator, Andre Martel, didn’t stand up for a healthier New Hampshire:

- **Senator Martel voted against the smoke-free bill.** He said “NO” to a healthier New Hampshire.
- **Senator Martel took campaign contributions from Big Tobacco** both before the legislation came to the Senate floor—and after he delivered his vote against it.

Senator Martel chose to protect Big Tobacco instead of our children’s health.
